
Several years ago at a National Specialty show, we saw another example of an owner and his heart dog. This owner-handler team competed in the conformation ring. They traveled all around the Midwest and occasionally to each of the coasts, amassing top honors at Dalmatian Specialties and All Breed shows. Tragically the dog became very ill, and in order to save the dog's life a limb had to be removed.

One year later this dog and his owner brought the house down at the Top Twenty event when they circled the ring together. I remember his owner telling me that he'd give all the awards back in a minute if he could just have his dog.

Not all heart dogs perform on a public stage. Many heart dogs have never seen the inside of a show or performance ring. These are the dogs that carry us through the low points in our lives. Be it a family illness, problems with a relationship or difficulties with a job, that special dog was there to comfort and distract us during our time of need. We don't take out ads for these dogs, congratulating them on yet another heroic act of kindness. No, we do something that means far more to them. We love them. And they love us back.

They are our best friends, our constant companions. They love us when it feels like no one else does, and often when we least deserve it. Their favorite thing to do with us is whatever it is we are doing right now. That might be going for a long walk, a ride in the car, or simply curling up on the sofa to watch a movie or read a book. It doesn't matter to these dogs of ours. We are so lucky to have them!
